 - I. <u>PURPOSE</u>

To transmit guidance to Local Workforce Innovation Boards (LWIBs) regarding the Demand Occupation Training List (DOTL) as outlined within policy on Training Provider and Program Eligibility.

I. <u>BACKGROUND</u>

The Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Section 134(c)(3)(G)(iii) indicates that training services for adults and dislocated workers must be directly linked to an in-demand industry sector or occupation in the local area or planning region, or in another area to which an adult or dislocated worker receiving services is willing to relocate. However, the local board may petition the State to approve occupations determined by the local board to be in sectors of the economy that have a high potential for sustained demand or growth in the local area.

Similarly, local plans for youth programs must also include consideration of in-demand industry sectors or occupations. WIOA Section 129(c)(2)(D) requires that local areas offer eligible youth occupational skill training, which includes priority consideration for training programs that lead to recognized postsecondary credentials that are aligned with in-demand industry sectors or occupations in the local area.

Section 3(23) of the WIOA defines the term "in-demand industry sector or occupation" as an industry sector that has a substantial current or potential impact (including through jobs that lead to economic self-sufficiency and opportunities for advancement) on the State, regional, or local economy, as appropriate, and that contributes to the growth or stability of other supporting businesses, or the growth of other industry sectors; or an occupation that currently has or is projected to have a number of positions (including positions that lead to economic self-sufficiency and opportunities for advancement) in an industry sector so as to have a significant impact on the State, regional, or local economy, as appropriate. The section also indicates the determination of whether an industry sector or occupation is in-demand for purposes of training shall be made by the State board, as appropriate, using State and regional business and labor market projections, including the use of labor market information.

In response to creating a demand-driven training system that addresses employer needs, the Illinois Workforce Innovation Board (IWIB) convened the Eligible Training Provider List (ETPL) Policy Workgroup. This workgroup is comprised of state level partners and local practitioners to review the state's approach to determine in-demand occupation selection criteria. The challenge for the EPTL Policy Workgroup was to construct a set of criteria that: eliminated occupations that did not provide sufficient opportunities (either in terms of potential job openings or adequate wage levels) for training participants; included a wide range of occupations so participants have sufficient choice to find the proper job/career; met the needs of employers in the region; and provided some flexibility for ever changing regional conditions.

The ETPL Policy Workgroup convened over several months to discuss potential options for a Demand Occupations Framework. These discussions were based on extensive research into best practices nationally, as well as a review of existing Illinois criteria. From the discussion scenarios were created that included various permutations of criteria including wages, number of job openings, and education levels. The level of education was a key consideration in the new criteria to ensure better return on investment of limited resources.

In Illinois in-demand occupations have historically been determined based on a local (Economic Development Region, or EDR) basis. However, there were disadvantages to this localized approach such as the complexity of analyzing and compiling lists for ten (10) different regions as well as the timeliness of the employment projection data at the EDR level. An approach based on statewide data both reduces the complexity of the process and improves the relevance of the data being used. It also aligns Illinois with U.S. Department of Labor expectations and most other states which identify their in-demand occupations based on statewide data. Therefore, the Policy Workgroup determined the in-demand occupations for the Demand Occupation Training List (DOTL) would be set at the state level.

Once there was consensus on the criteria and the resulting list, it was presented to the Illinois Workforce Partnership (IWP) prior to the final approval by the IWIB at their March meeting.

In February 2022, the Illinois Workforce Development System (IWDS) and other systems of record are going to be updated to reflect 2019 O*Net/SOC codes used to identify occupations within the O*Net taxonomy. Systems updates will include revisions from the current 2010 set of codes to the new 2019 codes associated with training programs and the DOTL. Changes in the O*Net/SOC codes will automatically be updated for all training programs currently in systems of record. Grantees and providers are strongly encouraged to review the updated codes related to their training programs to ensure the revisions were accurately reflected and determine if all occupations associated with the program are listed in the training program information.

Effective with these system changes, the new DOTL will provide the 2010 and 2019 codes for cross-reference. This conversion will require all grantees, providers, and career planners to begin utilizing only 2019 codes when entering training programs being considered for initial or continued eligibility and career planners when discussing career planning with participants. Since minimal occupation title changes occurred with this update, the 2010 titles are omitted from the new DOTL.

All occupations currently considered in-demand per the demand occupation criteria or via petition approval will continue to be considered in-demand under their current code (when no revision occurred) or new/revised code. In instances where a 2010 occupation may have split into two or more occupational codes under the 2019 revision, all related occupations are considered in-demand until new data and information become available to compare and update the list. For example, the current demand occupation 112031 Public Relations & Fundraising Managers has been revised as 112032 Public Relations Managers and 112033 Fundraising Managers under the new 2019 changes. In this instance, both 112032 and 112033 are considered demand occupations.

The additional change to the DOTL due to these updates is that there are dozens of additional codes and occupations being added to the DOTL that do not have data or information to support a decision to consider them in demand at this time. As such, the overall list is considerably lengthier than the current version.

Finally, to align with the systems of record, the "-" (dash) between the second and third digit of the O*Net codes has been removed. Grantees, providers, and career planners are requested to not include a dash when entering occupational codes. If a code is entered using the dash, the system will not recognize the code as a demand-occupation.

These changes in the systems of record are anticipated to be fully implemented on February 21, 2022, for use beginning February 22, 2022. Until that date, the 2010 version of O*Net/SOC codes should continue to be used. An informational webinar on these changes will be presented on February 16, 2022. Staff may register for the session at the <u>Illinois Center for Specialized</u> Professional Support WIOA Professional Development website.

II. <u>COMPONENTS</u>

This Notice describes the use, guiding framework, implementation timeline, petition process to add occupations, and disseminates the latest DOTL.

Use of Demand Occupation Training List

Career Planners are required to jointly develop with the participant an Individual Employment Plan (IEP) for WIOA Adults and Dislocated Workers or an Individual Service Strategy (ISS) for WIOA Youth. These plans are a roadmap to determining the combination of the career, training, and supportive services that help the participant secure sustainable employment and/or in the instance of youth advancement into postsecondary education.

The ISS and IEP are developed after a full assessment of the participant which may include a review of existing skills, interests, work history, individual barriers, and expectations. The Career Planner and participant must utilize the information gleaned from the assessments to document in the ISS or IEP the goals and steps necessary for meeting the individual's employment or education needs.

Part of this determination is working with the individual to assist them in making an informed decision and turning the results of the assessment into actionable steps.

Training services may be provided through an Individual Training Account (ITA) to adults, dislocated workers, and out-of-school youth (OSY). Additionally, Illinois has a waiver to allow in-school youth (ISY) ages sixteen to twenty-one (16-21) to utilize an ITA through June 30, 2022.

The DOTL is required to ensure the selected training program provided through an ITA aligns with the customer's skills and interests to an in-demand occupation and is directly related to the employment opportunities where the participant lives.

Career Planners need to become familiar with the guiding framework and the occupations on the list before the DOTL implementation date, so that the appropriate conversations can be had with participants as the updated list of in-demand occupations takes effect.

Given that Registered Apprenticeships Programs (RAPs) are a link to demonstrated hiring needs and WIOA provides automatic training provider eligibility to RAPS, ETA has determined that RAPs qualify as occupations in-demand in the local labor market. Similarly, training provided through contracts such as On-the-Job Training (OJT), customized training, incumbent worker training, internships, and paid or unpaid work experience opportunities, or transitional employment shall not be subject to the requirements of this policy.

Guiding Framework

The ETPL Demand Occupations Workgroup agreed upon the following criteria to determine indemand occupations to provide the most flexibility and qualitative based inclusion:

- <u>Education Level</u>: A minimum typical entry education level of High School diploma + moderate On-the-Job (OJT) and maximum typical entry level of bachelor's degree + long-term OJT.
- <u>Wages:</u> A median wage of 85% of the Living Wage¹ for 1 adult &1 child (85% of \$26.48=\$22.51).
- <u>Annual Average Job Openings</u>: Projected annual openings equal to at least 0.01% of statewide employment (646 annual openings).
- Addition of other occupations that approach, but do not meet, the data-based criteria to ensure a range of occupations in each of the State's Leading and Emerging industries.
 - These are reflected in the Growth/Moderate category.

To accommodate and recognize the addition of occupations approved through a Local or State Petition related to a Local or Statewide Priorities that otherwise don't meet the criteria for the higher level, a new category was created.

- These are reflected in the Added By Petition category.
 - May include the addition of other occupations meeting State emergency response, such as the COVID-19 pandemic, and planning needs, State or Local targeted industries and occupations or targeted populations, new grant opportunities, talent pipeline management, or other approved priorities.

Utilizing the criteria for projected annual openings, education, and wages, a statewide DOTL was generated using the Illinois Department of Employment Security <u>Long-Term COVID-</u> <u>impacted Occupational Projections (2018-2028)</u>.

After employing the criteria thresholds listed above, an additional level was applied to the resulting list to assist in implementation guidance and program approval processes. The final list, included in Attachment A - Demand Occupations Training List (DOTL) Final Policy Framework and List, reflects tiers of occupations in the following color scheme:

All occupations falling into the *Green* (Advanced Education and Middle Skills) and *Yellow* (Growth and Moderate Demand) tiers will be included on the DOTL, though training for occupations in the *Yellow* tiers will require additional documentation in the applicable IEP or ISS by Career Planners to ensure those occupations are supporting training participants to access and progress along a demonstrable career pathway available in their local area or an area in which the participant is willing to relocate and is intended to be followed by further training in

postsecondary education. Occupations in the *Orange* (Statewide and Local Priority) tiers represent those that have been added to address a state or federal priority or through a local petition approved by the Department as explained in the Requests for Non-Demand Occupational Training Petition Process section of this Notice. Since the DOTL is a statewide list, Career Planners should be quite mindful of the true demand for these occupations in their local or regional area as the data may not support this as a viable career option for their participants. As with the Yellow tiers, Career Planners will need to include additional documentation in the applicable IEP or ISS. Additionally, LWIBs should consider data that would support if there is a real demand (need) for training programs in occupations in this tier as they are reviewing training programs for initial and continued eligibility. Occupations falling into the *Red* (Low Priority) tier will not be included in the DOTL and require an LWIA petition or DCEO determination to be added.

Implementation Timeline

The new DOTL will begin for Program Year (PY) 2021 or July 1, 2021. Those participants currently enrolled in training that is for demand occupations of the previous DOTL will be allowed to complete their currently enrolled programs.

Participants enrolled in training in a demand occupation that is on the current list that expires June 30, 2021 will be allowed to continue their training.

Beginning July 1, 2021, career planners should utilize the new demand occupation training list (DOTL) in the development of any Individual Employment Plan (IEP) or Individual Service Strategy (ISS).

Participants that have already had an IEP or ISS developed with training related to a demand occupation that is slated to fall off the new list beginning July 1, 2021 and hasn't yet begun training and therefore the service hasn't been entered into IWDS/Career Connect, Career Planners will have until September 30, 2021 to enter the training service into the system. Consistent with this exception, when data for an occupation no longer meets the criteria to be approved for the DOTL, and therefore is removed from the list, there will be a ninety (90) day period (starting on the date of notice of the updated DOTL) when enrollment in an eligible training program related to that occupation can occur if significant progress towards selection of an occupation(s) has occurred and been documented in the IEP or ISS and system(s) of record.

Note Career Planners must be able to demonstrate significant progress has already been made with the participant on developing an IEP/ISS to make an occupational decision (Standard Occupational Classification (SOC) or O*Net code) and training program selection which is in an expiring demand occupation, or it may result in a monitoring finding. Significant progress indicates at minimum there have been discussions between the career planner and participant regarding an appropriate career plan including selection of a demand occupation(s) and related eligible training program(s). Only providing the DOTL to the participant or research of an occupation for consideration would not indicate significant progress. Career Planners should also make participants aware when an occupation they are considering or have selected is no longer in-demand so that they are allowed the opportunity for informed decision-making, one WIOA Notice No. 20-NOT-08, Change 2 February 14, 2022 Page 8 of 11

> that might lead to a change in planning based on the fact an occupation(s) is no longer indemand.

As new data sets are available, an updated DOTL will be generated and the career planning system of record will be updated accordingly. When the DOTL is updated occupations added by LWIA petition and/or DCEO determination will "sunset" and require a renewed petition. Occupations added by petition in the final quarter of the PY will remain on the DOTL for the subsequent PY, and then will be subject to a renewed petition.

LWIBs should review the DOTL prior to the implementation date to determine if their existing training providers offer one (1) or more programs of study that do not lead to an in-demand occupation on the updated DOTL. LWIBs are not allowed to create a DOTL that is specific or limited to their local area or region, rather they may develop guidance about occupations for career planners to discuss with participants to clarify occupations on the State DOTL that are most in-demand in the local area. Such guidance must instruct career planners that those discussions must only be presented as recommendations between the career planner and participant and shouldn't prohibit the participant from reviewing or selecting any occupation on the State DOTL to pursue in their career plan.

Requests for Non-Demand Occupational Training Petition Process

DCEO may add occupations to the DOTL if a determination is made based on State priorities (for example, current grant priorities, Early Childhood Workforce, COVID response, etc.).

LWIBs may submit a petition request to add non-demand occupations to the DOTL if they can provide documentation demonstrating the need to add the occupation based on data or other evidence that is not reflected in the IDES data.

Such evidence may include a new plant opening, facility expansion, addition to the state or federal key sector initiatives, or other reasons that indicate multiple job openings will be available in the local area.

A separate petition request (Attachment B - Demand Occupation Petition Form) must be submitted for each occupation the local area would like considered for inclusion on the DOTL according to the instructions in Attachment C - Demand Occupation Petition Form Instructions.

The request must at a minimum include:

- Documentation that the education needed to gain employment in the occupation is comparable to the data-based criteria that was used for the framework (minimum typical entry education level of High School diploma + moderate On-the-Job (OJT) and maximum typical entry level of bachelor's degree + long-term OJT);
- b. Entry-level regional wage data;
- c. Evidence of local employer demand. This could include: letters from employers that document how many people they anticipate hiring into the occupation, Talent Pipeline

Management data, or other evidence that demonstrate forthcoming substantial job openings in the region;

- d. Information indicating where and how the occupation fits into a Career Pathway leading to occupations that meet the wage and education criteria; and
- e. Evidence that the occupation is particularly accessible to one (1) or more Target Populations as identified in the <u>Illinois Unified State Plan</u> or <u>Regional/Local Plans</u>. The petition should include the population(s) in question and include evidence such as: letter(s) of support from a local employer, documentation of prior success employing individuals in the target population(s) in that occupation previously, etc.



June 30, 2021

Framework Overview

Utilizing criteria for projected annual openings, education, and wages, a statewide DOTL was created using the <u>Long-Term COVID-impacted Occupational Projections (2018-2028)</u> from the Illinois Department of Employment Security as source data.



Implementation Timeline

The new DOTL will begin for Program Year (PY) 2021 or July 1, 2021. Those participants currently enrolled in training that is for demand occupations of the previous DOTL will be allowed to complete their currently enrolled programs.

As new data sets are available, an updated DOTL will be generated and the career planning system of record will be updated accordingly. When the DOTL is updated occupations added by LWIA petition and/or DCEO determination will "sunset" and require a renewed petition. Occupations added by petition in the final quarter of the PY will remain on the DOTL for the subsequent PY, and then will be subject to a renewed petition.
