Damon completed his program of study and graduated with Honors and with an Associate in Applied Science in Information Technology. He then accepted a job at SIC in the Information Technology department where he is now employed in a job that he loves and is currently taking a few IT classes to improve his skills. He is also planning to continue his education in IT by taking classes in the future at SIU.

The Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Summit reflects the commitment to collaboration and the unified mission fostered by WIOA law. The Summit is designed to assist our local core partner staff and board members, by providing practical guidance on service and system integration. WADI currently has 19 participants that are graduating or receiving certificates in the month of May. One of the participants was hired by the City of Eldorado after his work experience was completed, as well. Ryan Douthitt and Nelda Booker attended the SIC Kid's Fair and the SIC Job Fair this month. They handed out informational packets, displayed a WIOA promotional video, and spoke with potential and current clients about what the WIOA program can offer to each of them. All of the career planners are gathering information from potential participants in hopes of serving them in the near future as funding becomes available!

SDC MONTHLY UPDATE

Our career planners are taking new applications for the summer semester. The summer semester will begin at Shawnee College on June 5th and the CDL classes are beginning on May 30th. We have one youth work experience employee in Union County but they will be finishing on May 30th. We plan on adding about 6 adult work experience participants soon. Victor Duckworth and the Career Planners attended the WIOA Summit on May 11th-12th either in person or virtually. The new Work Experience Coordinator/Billing Clerk, Caitlyn McGill, who started on April 10th is doing very well. June 11th – 20th Shawnee Development Council will be hosting the Innovative Readiness Training at the Anna-Jonesboro High School in Anna. We do these every other year. There is free medical, dental and other services provided to the community by military personnel. June 26th & 27th there will be a Career Planners training with Jim Potts at SIC.

Southern Illinois Highlights

Carbondale - Marion Area

The March 2023 unemployment rate was 4.0 percent. This was a decrease of -0.6 percentage point from the March 2022 rate of 4.6 percent. Total nonfarm employment in March 2023 increased by +1,300 jobs compared to March a year ago. Government payrolls increased over-the-year (+200).

Surrounding Counties

Total nonfarm payrolls increased by +50 jobs in March 2023 compared to a year ago.

Employment gains were posted in Government (+225), Construction (+125), Educational and Health Services (+25), and Natural Resources and Mining (+25).

No change was reported in Leisure and Hospitality, Other Services, Manufacturing, and Information.

March payrolls declined in Trade, Transportation, and Utilities (-275), Professional and Business Services (-25), and Financial Activities (-25).

Harrisburg Area

Total nonfarm employment increased by +650 jobs in March 2023 compared to March 2022.

Employment gains were posted in Government (+275), Trade, Transportation, and Utilities (+150), Educational and Health Services (+125), Information (+75), Natural Resources and Mining (+75) Construction (+50), Other Services (+50), and Manufacturing (+25).

Financial Activities payrolls were unchanged in March 2023.

Employment declined over-the-year in Leisure and Hospitality (-100) and Professional and Business Services (-50).

Olney - Mt. Carmel Area

Total nonfarm employment increased by +375 jobs in March 2023 compared to March 2022.

Payrolls increased in Government (+300), Educational and Health Services (+50), Other Services (+50), Leisure and Hospitality (+25), and Information (+25).

No changes were reported in Manufacturing, Professional and Business Services, Natural Resources and Mining, Construction, or Financial Activities.

Payrolls decreased in Trade, Transportation and Utilities (-75).
