As my first year as CFO draws to a close, I would like to start this by taking a moment to thank each of you for your confidence and encouragement. I can really think of only one thing to say "WOW! We have faced some challenging situations that have taken me out of my personal comfort zone and caused me to grow as an individual and I look forward to the next year and whatever situation may be just around the bend.

I appreciate her willingness to accept new assignments, many at the same time with the same deadline and her follow through. This Wednesday, December 5, I will be joining Illinois Department of Employment Security, Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity and the City of Harrisburg in an Employer Informational Workshop entitled "Meeting Business Needs". This workshop is designed to give employers an overview of business solutions available thru IDES, as well as information on retaining business and employees. Registration begins at 8:30, Workshop 9 – 12 at the Harris-Pruett Building 107 East Church Street, Harrisburg.

We have been busy scheduling rapid response events for those individuals recently laid off from the American Coal and Peabody's Willow Lake mine. The meeting for American Coal is scheduled for Wednesday December 5, at the WorkNet Center in Harrisburg, and the Willow Lake meetings are set for Wednesday and Thursday December 12 and 13, SIC campus building G. Since both of these events effect a large number of workers we have the opportunity of applying for a 1E Emergency Grant thru DCEO. This grant allows for training, supportive services including needs related payments, and case management, as well as a small amount of funds allocated to administration. As an area we do not meet some of the criteria, for example a 75 case load per case manager, but I have been advised by DCEO staff that with justification we can ask for exemptions. Kim and I are working with the service providers and hope to have the exemption request to DCEO by end of this week and the application submitted before the holidays. Since the grant and application process is intended to be quick turn-around we will need to have the executive committee meet to approve the submission.

Lots have been written about the fiscal cliff, but we are still teetering with no official information. We continue to plan for the worse, but hope for the best.

As we honor our success stories this meeting I am again reminded that those numbers that are continually reported in the media are real people and I feel honored that in some small way we were able to contribute to their success.

ANGELA JENKINS

Illinois workNet Center - Enfield

Case Manager: Paula Black

Angela first came to Wabash Area Development, Inc. after attending a Trade Workshop they had held when she had been laid off from a local manufacturer. She was only able to find work part-time at a local bank but was interested in the medical field.

She was enrolled in the Trade Adjustment Assistance Program and entered training in the Fall of 2010 in the Medical Office Assistant Program working toward an Associate Degree while continuing to work part-time. A few weeks into the program, her husband Jerry was rushed to the hospital with a serious heart condition. In the next few days Angela also fell ill and was rushed to a hospital in Indianapolis. A CAT scan revealed that she had a brain aneurysm located at the base of her brain in a vital and dangerous area.

Every time Jerry asked where Angela was, the family made excuses in order to keep him calm so he could rest. Once Angela was stabilized she had brain surgery. Although it was a success, the doctors warned that she would have a long recovery ahead of her.

Her husband was released from the hospital and once Angela returned home, Jerry was stronger and able to help her. She was unable to drive or walk long distances, but no matter what, she was going to register for the Spring 2011 semester. A determined Angela was true to her word and was released by her doctor on January 3, 2011.

A short eight months later, Jerry was struck again with another illness and was too weak to survive. He passed away in September 2011. They had been married for 30 years. Angela had much to deal with for over a year, none of it easy. Despite all she suffered, Angela remained strong, positive and steadfast to reach her goal.

Due to taking extra classes each semester in order to “catch up”; Angela graduated in May 2012 with an Associate Degree in Medical Office Assistant. Olney Central College awarded her the “Parkersburg Community Club Award” which is presented to a graduating student who is deemed to be the most outstanding in the field of office careers. The selection is based on scholarship, leadership and proficiency in the various secretarial skills. She was also awarded the colleges’ Medical Office Assistant Award.

DANIEL ARNOLD

Illinois workNet Satellite—Carmi

Recently, the Wabash Area Development’s WIA Program paid the tuition cost for Daniel Arnold from Edwards County to take a “757” Flight Program course in Las Vegas after being laid-off from flying small cargo planes. He wanted to further his education by upgrading his flying skills to be able to fly the bigger planes. After all the paperwork was finished away he went. Within two months he had completed his training with flying colors.

Now he had the task of trying to decide which job he was going to take. He had six different companies that wanted to hire him. He finally made the big decision to go with the Qatar Airlines in Qatar, Arabia. He will be starting at the end of January and making \$235,000 a year, he gets a new home at no cost to him, all utilities and food included and a car to drive when he is on land. This is definitely a success story. It just shows how the WIA Program can work for the person who wants to better themselves through education and hard work when they don’t have the financing themselves.

CRYSTAL ARCHEY

Illinois workNet Satellite - Ullin

Crystal Archey of Anna, Illinois applied to the WIA Program in December 2010. She had been employed by the Census Bureau and had been laid off after several months. Her previous employment had been in retail with Wal-Mart. Crystal really wanted to return to school to further her education. She desperately wanted to better herself so she can support herself and her child. Being the single mother of a 14 year old daughter, Amber, and only having unemployment and food stamps to live on, life was hard.

Crystal chose to pursue the Associate of Applied Science Degree program in Accounting at Shawnee Community College. She loved her classes and did well.

Her daughter Amber was ill from time to time during the two years Crystal was in school. Amber required surgery and was treated for a variety of other illnesses. On top of all of this, Crystal's ex-husband passed away in May 2011. All of this took its toll on Crystal and she had a rough time for several months.

Car troubles also threatened her ability to stay in school but she hung in there, and with hard work and lots of determination she made it to the internship stage of her training. H&R Block agreed to let Crystal complete her internship with their company, where she trained from February to March of 2012. During this time her knowledge and skill set grew tremendously and she excelled. At the end of her training she was offered a permanent position with the company where she remains employed.

Blake Schuchardt

Illinois workNet Center - Harrisburg

Blake Schuchardt of Eddyville, Illinois came into the Harrisburg workNet Center in August 2009 to find out about his unemployment benefits. Blake was still employed but had a letter of layoff from a Kentucky employer. After Case Manager, Ronda Glenn helped determine his steps for filing for unemployment; they discussed his options for school. Blake had completed all the pre-regs for the LPN program at Southeastern Illinois College, and had been accepted into the Practical Nursing Program for the Fall 2009. Blake was eligible under the Dislocated Worker program. He was enrolled in regular Dislocated Funds and dual-enrolled in Recovery Dislocated Worker Funds.

Blake's first semester at Southeastern Illinois College was a bit of a wakeup call. He passed all five classes with 'C', but decided he needed to do better. His next semester's grades improved to 'A' and 'B'. Since Blake was drawing unemployment from Kentucky which pays less than Illinois, Mid-5 helped with supportive service for Blake while attending school so he could concentrate on his grades. Blake had also completed his RN pre-regs and had been accepted for the RN program in the Fall of 2010.

Blake had now earned his LPN and RN degree but the real work was just starting, job hunting. Blake was able to start his nursing career at Carrier Mills Nursing home as an LPN making \$13.75 when he was exited from the program. During the first quarter follow-up, Blake informed Mid-5 that he was now working for Shawnee Correction Center making \$21.50 an hour as LPN with hopes of advancing up to a RN after the first of the year. He stated once again the best thing he ever did was to come into the Mid-5 office.

KENNETH HOPPER

Illinois workNet Center - Harrisburg

Case Manager: Rita Steele

Kenneth came to the office in March of this year looking for employment. He was hoping to find a job that would pay enough for him to become self sufficient and have benefits. He had a three year old daughter whom he had custody and needed to be able to provide for her adequately. The family was receiving food stamps and a medical card. Kenneth was a high school dropout and had been unemployed since the 3th of March. He had applied for unemployment, had a telephone interview, but hadn't heard from them to know if he was to receive unemployment.

While interviewing him he stated he would be interested in getting his CDL's. There was a truck driving class scheduled to start April 2nd. This was a short term training program and job placement was at a high rate. An appointment was set up and application was taken. When he arrived for his appointment he had everything required and in an orderly manner.

Kenneth enrolled at SIC truck driving class, passed the dot physical and drug screening and began his classes. He completed his classes on May 9, 2012, received his CDL license on the same day and immediately started looking for a job. On May 25th he came in to let us know he had just come from having a drug screening for a truck driving job and would get back with job information as soon as possible. This job was also a local job and he will be able to be home with his daughter. Congratulations Kenneth for a job well done!

ELIZABETH BULLOCK

Illinois workNet Center - Cairo

Elizabeth Bullock came to Shawnee Development Council, Inc. seeking help to retrain after working at Verizon for 15 years. She was forced to retire but wasn't ready to quit working. Elizabeth wanted to go into the Medical Coding Specialist Field. She tested high on the TABE test and started classes in the fall of 2009 and in May 2010 received a certificate of Coding and Billing and then received the Medical Coding Specialist degree in August 2010.

Elizabeth lived on her PELL grant while attending classes and Supportive Service WIA provided. Elizabeth applied for many jobs and thought that it was her age keeping her from finding anything. During a conversation with her case Manger they discussed the fact that since she was over 55 she could check into the Title 5 (Older American's) program.

Within a few weeks after applying she started as a Title V worker in the Johnson County Office and when an opening as a part time clerk came open she applied for that position. During this time she received help through Shawnee Development Council, Inc. with LIHEAP.

Elizabeth is part time clerk for Shawnee Development Council, Inc. in the Johnson County Outreach office.
