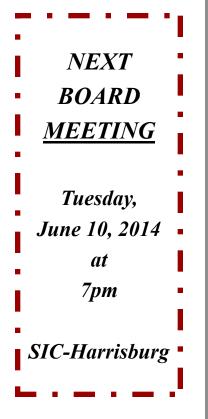

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NOTES FROM THE OFFICE...

Doris Martin, from Shawnee Development, and I attend the Brookport City Council meeting last night to give a brief update on the status of our participants involvement in the tornado cleanup efforts. We currently have seven working and two additional workers in the process of completing the applications. Most of the feedback from the City officials was positive. They have been impressed with the workers efforts and appreciate the added manpower. This grant goes until June 30 of next year.



I also attended a Saline County and Area Interagency meeting that was hosted by Egyptian Heath Department in Eldorado. It is always interesting to learn what is going on in other agencies and establish connections to better serve our clients. I was able to make contact with a potential board member from Gallatin County and possible someone who may be interested in serving on our board from Wayne County.

We will be having yet another Trade Workshop for the next group of effected Airtex workers on Thursday. WADI staff have been making contact with those eligible individuals, but have had limited success getting them interested in training. They do have three or four individual's paperwork completed and ready to submit to DCEO for Merritt Staff approval. Once DCEO has approved the training plan for each individual, I will complete and submit the application for a Trade grant.

We have not heard any new information on the summer youth program. Each of the service providers are preparing so that once we have been given the approval we will be ready to quickly roll out the program and put our youth to work.

I mentioned last month that as an area we had quite a bit of unexpended funds. On May 1st we were finally able to make some transfers between providers so I anticipate that all of the available funds will be expended prior to the June 30, 2014 end of the fiscal year. Shawnee Development was unable to fully utilize their allotment and transferred \$15,000 in adult funding to Mid 5 and \$48,000 in dislocated worker funding (\$10,000 to WADI and \$38,000 to Mid 5).

NOTES FROM THE OFFICE...

Last minute transfers have historically been somewhat of an issue for our area. We may need to look at changing our transfer policy. The current policy is really vague and leaves the action to the service providers.

We have a new member orientation meeting scheduled May 21 at the WorkNet Center in Harrisburg. We are planning on serving a light lunch so if you have not yet sent Kim your rsvp please do so...

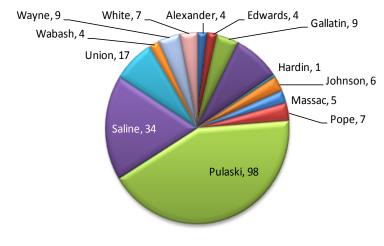

Southern Illinois Highlights

Unemployment fell in 15 of 21 counties in Southern Illinois when compared to one year ago. The data is not seasonally adjusted.

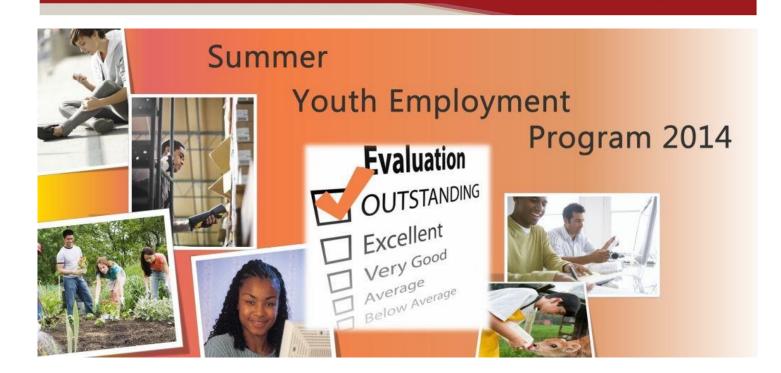
Labor market conditions remained stable in early 2014 in Southern Illinois. Over the year employment increases were reported in Retail Trade, Health Care Services and Wholesale Trade. Construction payrolls declined as severe weather conditions prevailed this winter. The inclement weather conditions also affected employment in Retail Trade and Leisure-Hospitality. Government employment continued to decline.

Employment opportunities were available in Health Care and Medical Support, Sales, Food Service, Transportation, Office and Administrative Support, and Computer Operations. Jobs were also available in Engineering, Production Occupations, Business Occupations, Protective Services, and Installation, Maintenance, and Repair Occupations.

The unemployment rate identifies those who are out of work and seeking employment. A person who exhausts benefits, or is ineligible, still will be reflected in the unemployment rate if they actively seek work.

The IDES supports economic stability by administering unemployment benefits, collecting business contributions to fund those benefits, connecting employers with qualified job seekers, and providing economic information to assist career planning and economic development.

Historically, the Illinois unemployment rate is higher than the national rate. Only six times since January 2000 has the state rate been lower than the national rate. The data is seasonally adjusted and includes times of both economic expansion and contraction.



Connecting Youth and Employers!

Youth in communities throughout Illinois will participate with the state's 2014 Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP).

- Youth ages 16-24 qualify if they meet income requirements, receive a form of state assistance, or are graduates of the Lincoln ChalleNGe Academy.
- Participating youth benefit from paid work experience, career education, and learning job readiness skills.
- Employers participate by providing work experience.
